Located in the United Community Center (UCC), the expansive facility is uniquely designed to provide daily care to frail Latino elderly. The center also supports primary physicians through outreach and education, and provides services for families and caregivers including training and support groups.

# HISTORY & PARTNERSHIP

The culmination of more than four years of coordinated planning and assessment, the Latino Geriatric Center opened its doors in January 2007. A collaborative effort involving the medical, nonprofit, and academic communities, the center brings together multiple partners to provide early detection and treatment of Alzheimer's disease in an underserved population.

projected that Alzheimer's disease and other dementias will increase six-fold among Hispanics during the first half of the century, resulting in 1.3 million Hispanics with Alzheimer's by 2050. As Hispanics face significant barriers in receiving proper diagnosis and accessing culturally competent treatment for Alzheimer's disease, the Latino Geriatric Center addresses the cultural and medical needs of the aging Hispanic population.
